PaCER Training Program

This program teaches patients how to conduct research projects with, by, and for patients, thereby enabling PaCER graduates to work as partners in health research projects and to support new roles for patients in health care.



PaCER Contract Opportunities

PaCER graduates become connected to a network of professionals who work on research projects related to patient-engaged research. PaCER graduates assist health research and community engagement projects and are supported through AbSPORU in identifying opportunities.

About the PaceR Training Program

The PaCER training program teaches learners how to conduct research with, by and for patients in their communities. This program enables patients to tell their stories with the goal of incorporating research-informed patient voices into health system research, planning and policy.

Two primary goals of the PaCER training program are to:



Incorporate a research-based patient perspective into healthcare and health research



Teach non-traditional learners research skills and how to conduct patientengagement research

Graduating from the Pacer Training Program



This is an institutionally recognized program and graduates receive a University of Calgary Continuing Education Certificate. Upon graduation, PaCER training program graduates become connected to a large network of professionals who work on research projects related to patient-engaged research.



PaCER training program graduates may work on health research projects, in research teams and are supported through Alberta Strategy for Patient Oriented Research* (AbSPORU) in identifying these opportunities.

Benefits Sponsor role Continuing Education role Join a community



When you sponsor a cohort in the PaCER training program, you benefit a group of patients. By sponsoring a cohort, you:

- Ensure your health and healthcare improvement efforts are patient-centered
- Contribute to continued inclusion of patient perspective in health research and the health care system
- Enable community involvement and community knowledge translation amongst patient groups
- Develop citizen capacity for involvement in future research and quality improvement efforts
- Acquire a PaCER student authored research report and, if appropriate, the primary data
- Acquire an academically-reviewed research report, depending on negotiated agreement terms



ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES



Sponsor role

- Establish research topic
- Provide funding for up to six students (one cohort) for \$45,000 per cohort, unless sponsoring multiple cohorts
- Recruit students
- Provide a key liaison when working with Continuing Education and the PaCER Training Program
- Promote the potential for new patient roles



Continuing Education role

- Provide a key liaison/program manager to work with the Sponsor
- Deliver the three-course training program
- Provide support for students when submitting an ethics protocol
- Provide Sponsor with updates on student progression and completion
- Provide transcripts and completion certificate to students
- Provide the final student-authored research report and, if appropriate, the primary data
- Provide the agreed to invoices and financials
- Based on Sponsor needs and negotiated terms:
 - Hire a PaCER mentor to support students with the program's research components
 - Provide the Sponsor with an academically-reviewed and edited research report

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

For admission to the non-credit Certificate in Patient and Community Engagement Research, applicants must have:

- Access to or own a computer or laptop
- Access to a reliable internet connection.
- Basic computer skills including typing, emailing, and web skills
- Experience as a patient or with the healthcare system
- Interest in health research
- Previous engagement experience and/or experience on committees is considered an asset



The PaCER Training Program will:

- Be delivered as a blended-learning program or entirely online.
- Make use of a variety of approaches, including:
 - Live online synchronous sessions via Zoom
 - Class discussions
 - Peer feedback
 - Case studies
 - Qualitative data collection
 - Qualitative data analysis
 - Report writing
- Finish with students completing an internship-style research project and report during their final course.



Students are expected to:


- Attend all sessions
- Manage their time effectively
- Dedicate time to focus on course work
- Collaborate with their classmates on group projects
- Read material before each online class (if applicable)
- Take notes
- Be active in online class (participate, inquire)



By completion of the program, successful students will be able to:

- Apply relevant theories, including salutogenesis, narrative, patient engagement theories, and qualitative research theories
- Co-design and conduct research in full compliance with ethics protocols and the PaCER framework for engagement ethics
- Carry out research project logistics
- Apply, test, and expand engagement strategies with special health populations
- Use qualitative research methods and skills
- Analyse qualitative research data
- Write formal research reports
- Demonstrate leadership and team-building skills
