

Rationale

- If we wish to strengthen public health, we need to demonstrate its value
- One key resource for doing so: *data infrastructure*
- The primary determinants of population health and well-being reflect public policy outside of the health care sector
- This demands an inter-ministerial conversation

Meeting highlights

- Some *benefits* of cross-ministry data sharing:
 - Provide evidence to inform policy decisions
 - Support improved outcomes for clients
 - Increase efficiency and coordination

Meeting highlights (cont'd)

- Some *challenges and barriers* to cross-ministry data sharing:
 - The data itself (e.g., quality, link-ability)
 - Ministry culture (e.g., risk aversion)
 - Processes and policies around ownership (legislation)
 - Trust

Inter-ministerial data sharing - needs

- Framework to support and govern data sharing across ministries
 - Leadership, legislation, knowledge translation
- Infrastructure (data hub) that includes partnership agreements and processes with clear roles, responsibility and accountability
- Vision of data sharing that is not project-specific but anchored in a population health / social determinants of health perspective

Opportunities and next steps

- Leverage current projects where data sharing has been achieved
 - Potential prototype
- Build Community of Practice within Government of Alberta
 - Begin with one-day showcase, to build awareness and share information across ministries
- Identify working group members and convene follow-up meeting
 - Fall 2019
