Reflections on receiving the O'Brien Societal Impact Award: Team work for capacity building locally and globally

Dr. Jennifer Hatfield will share insights on the importance of capacity building as a mechanism for social impact. Drawing on examples from the partnership to build a Master's of Public Health in Tanzania, Our One Health Field Schools and our local engagement with inner city organizations, Dr. Hatfield will highlight the process and principles that guide our work in CSM.

Dr. Hatfield was appointed as Associate Dean, Global Health in 2009 and then in 2014 was appointed to lead an expanded portfolio including local community engagement and the CSM Indigenous Health pillar. As the Associate Dean for Strategic Partnerships and Community Engagement in the Cumming School she is committed to working with and for communities locally and globally. She is a researcher, educator and leader in global health with a focus on public health, and particularly health promotion in low and middle income countries. She is dedicated to promoting scholarship in the area of global health research governance that promotes ethical and equitable partnerships and principles.

Dr. Hatfield has supervised dozens of graduate and undergraduate student research projects in Canada and abroad. She is committed to both building the capacity of the Cumming School of Medicine to respond to global health challenges and to ensuring that the next generation of researchers and clinicians will be ready for the future as global citizens.
