Findings & Future Directions: UCalgary's Age-Friendly Assessment



About the Assessment

- Timeline: July 2022 March 2023
- Purpose: To assess strengths and gaps in UCalgary's age-friendliness
- Methods & Participants:
 - Inventory: Completed by 10 administrators to identify existing age-friendly campus practices and features
 - Survey: Completed by 1,953 faculty, staff, and students to understand their awareness, perceptions, and beliefs about age-friendliness and age-inclusivity on campus



Results Related to Research

FACULTY COLLABORATION

Two-thirds of faculty reported being available for informal discussions about aging-related research, but only one-fifth were encouraged to collaborate on such research across faculties and departments.

OLDER ADULT PERSPECTIVES AND ENGAGEMENT

7.3% of faculty were made aware of issues facing older adults that could be incorporated into their research.

12.4% believed that research across disciplines regularly included the perspectives of older adults.

UCalgary encourages community-engaged research relevant to aging across a range of disciplines.

EXPERTISE AND FUNDING

It is unclear whether academic units prioritize hiring faculty with research expertise in aging.



Few faculty (16.9%) and students (15.0%) were aware of special funding opportunities for those interested in conducting aging-related research.



STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

A small percentage of faculty (9.0%) and students (12.7%) indicated that their academic unit informs students about research projects related to aging.

Only 15.9% of students reported being encouraged to conduct research on aging-related issues.

DISSEMINATION

Approximately **one-third** of faculty and **one-fifth** of students were aware of aging-related research publicized to the campus community.

13.5% of students reported being encouraged to attend research presentations on aging topics.

ACTION PLAN

The assessment findings informed an action plan to address identified gaps. The goals shown here are part of that plan and focus specifically on research.

GOAL 5

Aging research is prioritized and supported at an institutional level.

GOAL 6

Aging research is prioritized and supported within relevant faculties and departments.

Aging education and research are informed by the needs and interests of seniors-serving organizations and older adults.
